

## AMTA Begins a New Year of Collaboration

The AMTA Board of Directors, standing committee chairs and staff attended National Leadership Orientation (NLO) in Chicago on March 1–2, 2007. Attendees were trained in their roles and responsibilities as national volunteers and as the staff who work most closely with the national volunteers.

Each year participants in NLO use group exercises to visualize their understanding of the history of the profession, their goals for the future and how they'll work together to get there. NLO gives new and returning volunteers the opportunity to refresh and improve their leadership skills in areas like legal and financial responsibilities, knowledge-based decision making, strategic planning and in their roles as ambassadors for AMTA. Volunteers require all of these skills to effectively and responsibly serve AMTA members.

Following NLO the board held its March meeting, the beginning of AMTA's yearly planning cycle. After taking their oath to faithfully perform their duties to the best of their ability, board members addressed several issues including:

- **Approving policy changes to require a code of conduct.**  
Codes of conduct are used by organizations to outline the responsibilities and best practices of its members. Each AMTA volunteer is required to sign an appropriate code of conduct. This code of conduct is intended to provide a benchmark for personal and professional behavior, and support mutual trust and accountability. It affirms for members that volunteers carry out their duties and responsibilities with care, loyalty and obedience.
- **Making changes to candidacy and elections.**  
AMTA is committed to attracting qualified candidates for national leadership, while encouraging openness and efficiency in the election process. The board also wants to energize candidate recruitment and the election process and help educate members to be qualified candidates. Accordingly, the board approved workgroup recommendations to change the bylaws for the Commission on Elections to revise duties of the Commission on Candidacy. The board also changed policy to establish a code of conduct for the commission, effective for the 2007 national election.
- **Approving streamlined bylaws and moving policy statements from bylaws into policy.**  
Bylaws define and govern the internal affairs of the association, and they should remain constant with few changes. The board is dedicated to improving procedures for the

Some staff members decided to raise money for charity by riding bicycles to the meeting from Chicago to St. Louis. The charity they chose was Children's Miracle Network, an alliance of children's hospitals.

The Ace staffers knew it was going to be important to the success of their 300-mile trek to have massages at the end of each day. They used AMTA's Find a Massage Therapist® national locator service to find a massage therapist and called Mulhall.

What they didn't know was that Mulhall has a special connection to Children's Miracle Network—her nephew was born at Children's Hospital in St. Louis, a participating hospital. Because they were raising money for this charity, Mulhall offered to massage them for free.

As it turned out, the appreciative staff was very generous with its tips. And Mulhall got the opportunity to meet some wonderful people who were giving back to the charity that had helped her family.

At the end of the 300-mile bicycle journey, the Ace Hardware staff had raised almost \$300,000 for Children's Miracle Network—nearly \$10,000 per mile! And Mulhall contributed to their success by providing her skills to keep them on track.

Dear Fellow AMTA Ambassadors,

On a daily basis you're at the front line, fighting for clients, wrestling to balance your professional and personal lives and trying to stay ahead of the curve by keeping up with advancing knowledge. Probably far from your mind is the best way to ensure credibility for the profession and protect yourself and the public from unqualified practitioners—a function that a government agency could easily accomplish by licensure. AMTA believes state licensing is the best way to achieve this, so three years ago the AMTA Board of Directors created a goal to work towards fair and consistent licensing standards in all states. The goal of AMTA's advocacy for licensure is to protect you and the public alike and also to make it easier in the future for you to move your practice to another state without interference from unfair local ordinances.

To this end, AMTA has developed a Government Relations (GR) Program to work for consistent licensure. The GR Program has a centralized approach and relies on close collaboration with AMTA chapters. Together with AMTA's activities in building professional competency and improving collaboration within the profession, the GR Program is adding to AMTA's advocacy for well-trained massage therapists, and increasing the value of massage therapy education. It is part of AMTA's ongoing work to advance the common interest of the profession and our members, and it is just one of the many ways AMTA is working to broaden the opportunities for you to practice. As ambassadors for your profession, I encourage you to take this

for our success.

I encourage you to join with me, join with the AMTA Board of Directors, join with the GR Program and join with your chapter representatives to work together as we move closer to the long-range goal for AMTA members to be the preferred providers for massage therapy as a routine part of society's health and well-being. On the recommendations of the Bylaws, Policy and Procedures Workgroup and AMTA's attorney, the board approved a revised set of bylaws, and updated policy accordingly. • **Updating volunteer job descriptions.**

AMTA wants to make sure volunteer members have the resources they need for a successful and fulfilling experience. To help them understand the roles and responsibilities of various volunteer positions, AMTA has been creating and updating job descriptions through the work of the Governance Committee. At this meeting, the board approved updated job descriptions for several more positions.

In other actions, the board approved changes to clarify chapter financial and administrative reporting requirements. It also approved a policy change reflecting the revision of the Government Relations Standing Committee to an Operational Committee. Finally, meeting attendees received a projected year-end financial report. When the audit is completed, AMTA should show another year of growth. Complete details of AMTA's financial performance in FY06/07 will be available in the July/August issue of *Hands On*.

Board members will try to respond in a timely way:

- Acknowledgement of e-mail or voicemail message in one to two days.
- Acknowledgement of mailed letter within one to two weeks.

- Response to e-mail or voicemail question in two to three days.
- Response to a mailed letter within one to two weeks.

Board members are approachable! You should feel free to talk to them at board meetings and at the AMTA National Convention.

If you can't attend a board meeting or the convention, you can still make your voice heard by responding to the surveys you receive. Your responses are a valuable source of information for the board for its knowledge-based decision making. The data provided by member surveys have an impact on a wide range of programs and services. This is what is meant by being member-driven—what you say and think counts!

One last tip regarding surveys: please try to fill them out and submit them as soon as possible after receiving them, while the questions are fresh in your mind. Timely information from our members is a very important tool. Most of the surveys AMTA sends to you take only a few minutes to fill out, and when you complete some of them you may be entered in a drawing for a prize, such as a free trip to the convention!

## Massage for Special Needs

For the past two years, Denis Larsen (NJ), LMT, NCTMB, has been splitting his time between his two clinics—one in New Jersey, and the other in Isla Mujeres, Quintana Roo in Mexico, where he provides pro bono massage services for its residents.

In 2004 Larsen was part of the Health Services Massage Team for the 2004 Paralympics in Athens, Greece. It was there that he got first-hand experience working with athletes with physical disabilities. After his return to the United States he formed a nonprofit corporation, Paratherapy Society, Inc., to help deliver needed therapies.

While seeing clients in Isla Mujeres, he discovered several who suffered from Decompression Illness (DCI). The men were all commercial fishermen who used SCUBA to gather lobster and conch on the ocean floor. One was in a wheelchair and unable to walk, his brother was in a walker and a third could walk with a cane. Larsen treated them over an extended period with satisfying results. There was no change in their gross symptoms, but all felt better after the massage. The client in the wheelchair thought he regained some sensation in his legs.

When he learned of another patient with DCI, Larsen asked to be allowed to try massage while the diver underwent oxygen therapy. Larsen first called Divers Alert Network (DAN), the world authority on dive medicine located at Duke University, to see what they had to say. DAN said that doctors were about evenly split about divers receiving massage immediately after experiencing symptoms of DCI. DAN further reported no history

of massage being done during oxygen therapy.

After speaking with Martin Tito Avila Frias, the doctor in charge of the therapy program, Larsen was given permission to work on the diver during his therapy. While the diver received oxygen therapy for almost one full hour, Larsen used gentle stretches, repetitive bends and palming compression to promote blood circulation through the man's legs.

When they were finished, the diver reported that he could walk a little easier with less pain. So the next day they did it again, with the same results. The following day, the diver was discharged to his home.

It's what Larsen loves most—being able to help, with massage, those who might not otherwise have access to it. "Most of the islanders would never receive a massage if they had to pay for it," he says. "They are truly grateful for the work I do with them."

# Members Make NMTAW Their Own

In October 2006 AMTA members, chapters, and schools celebrated National Massage Therapy Awareness Week® (NMTAW) in exceptional and creative ways. ## AMTA Chapters

# Successful Test-Taking Tips

Whether you're a recent graduate or a massage therapist who's been practicing for years, your education in massage therapy will continue throughout your career. Currently 37 states and Washington, D.C., require you to successfully complete an exam in order to legally practice. Many continuing education (CE) courses also require passing a test to earn CE contact hours. Some employers even require you to take an exam as part of the interview process. Here are 10 test-taking tips to ensure your success, whether you're preparing for certification, licensure or any other exam.

- 1) **Sleep.** You should get six to eight hours of sleep every day. A 2003 Harvard Medical School study found that a good night's sleep improved motor skills, and that's not all! "The brain continues to learn during sleep," says Matthew Walker, a neuroscientist who led the study. "Memory processing is so absolutely dependent on a full night's sleep that you shortchange your brain if you don't get it." (*Harvard Gazette*, Nov. 20, 2003)
- 2) **Study.** Yes, study. Try to study on a regular schedule, at least eight hours a week, for 60 days prior to the examination. It's important to build on the skills and knowledge you gained in school. Revisit your books and curriculum and compare it to available materials that outline the test, such as an examination information packet. Ask yourself, "What am I missing?" And be sure to study in increments. If you make a study schedule—two hours a day, three to four times a week—your mind can move learned information from short-term memory to long-term memory.
- 3) **Know Your Learning Style.** Before you buy any study materials, figure out your learning style. According to Richard M. Felder, a professor at North Carolina State University, this will help you select study materials that best suit you. If you're an Active and Reflective Learner, actually doing the task and speaking out loud will help you remember the material. If you're a Sensor and Intuitive Learner, giving examples and scenarios would help you most, and so on. Go to [www.engr.ncsu.edu/learningstyles/ilsweb.html](http://www.engr.ncsu.edu/learningstyles/ilsweb.html) to take the test and find your learning style. It's free!
- 4) **Purchase the Right Study Materials.** Buy study materials that suit your learning style, and make sure they're up-to-date. Buy a book or DVD that covers the material. Attend a review course that suits your learning style.
- 5) **Study Weak Areas First.** Now that you've identified your learning style and bought the right study materials, make your study plan. Remember it's best to study your weakest subjects first. Try to concentrate at least 70 percent of your scheduled study time on these areas. In no time, your weakest subjects could be your strongest!
- 6) **Review Strong Areas.** Spend the last 30 percent of your scheduled study time on your strongest subjects. Even though you may be confident in these areas, you can still enhance them with review. You could learn new methods in familiar subjects. And, it feels great to end your study time with something you know well!
- 7) **Use Memory Aids.** Learn how to use acronyms, mnemonics and abbreviations to remember different subject areas. You've learned some in school (SITS, "Tom, Dick, and Harry" and SOAP)—now make your own. Visit [www.psywww.com/mts/mem.html](http://www.psywww.com/mts/mem.html) for more information on techniques to increase your learning. Graphs, charts, pictures and flashcards can be wonderful recall tools as well.
- 8) **Schedule Stress-free Time.** Whatever you do to relieve your stress, schedule it during your day, every day. Exchange massages with another massage therapist. Meditate 15 minutes prior to study time and 15 minutes after. Attend a local yoga or aerobics class. If you haven't made any time to relax during your day, make it now!
- 9) **Follow Instructions.** It's very important that you read all the test instructions before you take the test. Also, review any information you were sent with your test registration confirmation. On examination day, be sure to arrive at least 20 minutes prior to your scheduled time, with the proper identification.
- 10) **Be Optimistic.** You're a massage professional, and in your profession optimism is a primary way to achieve good health. Believe that you will pass the exam. Leave yourself notes in your study area or on your refrigerator, and look in the mirror every day to say, "I am going to pass." Stay focused, stay positive, and you will make your own good luck!

## AMTA Supports Anti-discrimination Concept

In its April conference call, the AMTA Board of Directors voted to support the Integrative Healthcare Policy Consortium's idea to create legislation that would prevent discrimination between types of health care providers by any federal health care program.

This initiative is in the early stages, and language for the legislation is not yet available for AMTA to review. However, the intention is that legislation will ensure the federal government cannot discriminate against types of health care providers, either in terms of insurance coverage or in opportunities for support, such as loans and education.

A prohibition like this would have two main benefits:

- Members of Congress would no longer have to choose sides or get tangled up in scope of practice issues that now bog down many health care bills.
- The health care policy debate could focus on patient care, regardless of which groups have the biggest lobbying budget.

The ultimate goal is to create equal opportunities among authorized providers and health care institutions, and to increase patient choice.

We'll keep you informed as this develops and let you know ways that you can get involved to support this effort.

## A Brief History of GR at AMTA

State governments and their regulation of the massage therapy profession are constantly changing. To keep up with these changes, and to advance AMTA's advocacy of fair and consistent licensing of massage therapy in all states, AMTA launched a new, centralized Government Relations (GR) Program in May 2006.

This GR Program coordinates the work of chapter volunteers in all states to achieve AMTA's goal of fair and consistent state licensure. It also works to include, in any new legislation, the "must have" elements and "should have" elements of a baseline massage therapy practice act.

The GR Program was developed over several years. In May 2003, the AMTA Board of Directors approved supporting portability of massage practice across state lines. A few months later the board approved a strategic focus on advocacy and influence, to work toward creation of a GR Program.

To make sure this program would meet our advocacy needs, AMTA gathered information from outside experts on massage practice laws and chapter GR activities. This research was presented to the board in March 2005. As a result, the board changed the program focus from consulting with legislators about regulation of massage to proactively pursuing licensure in every state.

Reaching our long-range goals for portability requires fair and consistent licensing in all states. So, AMTA has developed a centralized and consistent approach to government relations now carried out by staff, with the support and input of volunteers on the new Government Relations Operational Committee.

## Research News

### NCCAM "Backgrounder" on Massage Therapy

### Recently Published Articles by Foundation Volunteers

The article draws attention to massage therapy as a common treatment for neck pain and points out the need for more specific information, such as techniques and dosing, in research on massage therapy.

Foundation volunteers Christopher Moyer, PhD, of Oneonta, New York, and Shay Beider, MPH, LMT, of Los Angeles, were recently published in *Evidence-based Complementary and Alternative Medicine*. Their article, "Randomized Controlled Trials of Pediatric Massage: A Review," analyzed twenty-four randomized controlled trials, and found that massage significantly reduced anxiety levels in subjects aged 2 to 19 years.
