High Number Of Attendees, Exhibitors Make Phoenix Convention A Success

AMTA's 2000 National Convention in Phoenix, Arizona, last September was a rousing success.

Nearly 1,000 people attended the record-breaking convention. In addition, the Exhibit Hall featured a record 118 exhibitors.

"By all accounts, this was the finest convention we ever had," says AMTA Executive Director Marlys Sperger. "Both the educational seminars and the exhibit hall were extremely well-attended, and everyone seemed to have a great time at our social events. The convention really did live up to its theme: 'Creating Synergy Through Warmth, Healing and Spirit.'"

For the keynote address, "Sound Healing and Massage Therapy in the New Millennium," speaker **Steven Halpern (CA)** had a standing-room-only crowd for his presentation.

Another highlight was a panel discussion by representatives of the Federation of Therapeutic Massage, Bodywork and Somatic Practice Organizations, who demonstrated self-healing techniques for upper

body restriction. Presenters included **Adela T. Basayne (OR)** (AMTA); Philip Guzelf (American Organization for Bodywork Therapies of Asia™); Richard Goldsand (Feldenkrais Guild® of North America); Carol

Briskin (American Polarity Therapy Association); **Michael William Murphy (CA)** (Rolf Institute); and **Marianna Hartsong (AZ)** (Trager® Institute).

Several AMTA committees conducted hearings and presentations to attendees. The Special Committee for Insurance Issues made a presentation on the pros and cons of insurance reimbursement, and gave predictions

Registry Information Now Fulfilled Online

AMTA's *Membership Registry* has served as a listing of members to members. Quickly outdated and never circulated outside AMTA membership, the *Registry* has been a limited resource for members, has not served to increase members' clientele, and has not been available to the general public. After reviewing extensive member input, the association learned that members would rather have AMTA focus its resources on helping them grow and succeed in practice. Therefore, AMTA will not publish the *Registry*.

Instead, to help members develop professionally, the association has introduced AMTA's *Find A Massage Therapist*™ national locator service. This service has proven to be a significant source of new business for participating Professional Active members, and it enables Professional Active

CEUs Can Now Accrue

In September, 2000, the AMTA Board of Directors changed the continuing education requirement policy to allow Professional Active members' continuing education to be accrued over a four-year period.

The policy now reflects that Professional Active members will have four years to complete 48 hours of education. Specifically, the policy states: "Beginning January 1, 2001 or after the first full year of Professional Active membership, a member is required to complete 48 clock hours of continuing education every 4 years for renewal as a Professional Active member of AMTA."

This change gives you flexibility to take longer classes and count all the hours toward the requirement or to take a year off from education, if necessary, and still be in good standing with the association. Your renewal form will still ask you about continuing education information, and your record will be kept up to date each year. Compliance audits will begin in 2005.

Associate Members Urged To Upgrade Membership

AMTA Associate membership is limited to three years. Therefore, Associate members must upgrade to Professional Active status at the start of their fourth year. To upgrade, you must submit **one** of the following:

- A copy of your diploma or proof of graduation from a **500-hour**, current AMTA School member training program or COMTA-accredited program;*
- A copy of your current AMTA-accepted jurisdictional license (AL; AR (1988 or later); CT; DE;

FL; IA; LA; MD; NE; NH; NM; NY; ND; OH; OR; RI; SC; TN; UT; VA; WA; WI; WV; Tuscon, AZ; Ontario, Canada);

- Proof of being certified by the National Certification Board for Therapeutic Massage and Bodywork.

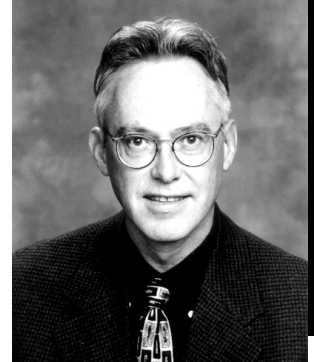
The historic 2000 National Presidential Election clearly proves that our involvement, via our individual vote, has tremendous influence. In this light, I urge you to participate

Another avenue of involvement is expressing your voice. To express your opinion on local issues, speak to your elected and appointed chapter officers. On national concerns, speak to elected and appointed national officers. AMTA's wonderful staff is also eager to hear your concerns and challenges. By hearing your voice, AMTA can successfully complete its mission.

By extension, consider exercising your voice by seeking a national elected office. Candidate applications for the next election cycle are available beginning January, 2001. If you are a Professional member, you can submit your application, be placed on the ballot, express your views in the candidate election bulletin, and, if elected, be a voice on the national Board of Directors. You also have the opportunity to seek elected office at the state and unit levels; consider running for your chapter Board of Directors or unit leadership.

Completing all AMTA surveys you receive in the mail or see online is another way to exercise your individual voice. Since 1994, AMTA has been using survey methods to gather information from you. Ana-



lysts then assist us in gathering statistically significant data from a cross section of members. The next time you receive a survey from AMTA, let us hear your voice. The information AMTA gathers contributes heavily to knowledge-based governance by the board. Your individual voice is translated into a collective body of information used to make decisions that service us all.

As a membership association, and as elected and appointed officers at the national, chapter and unit levels, we are dedicated to hearing your individual voice while reserving action for the collective good of the entire membership.

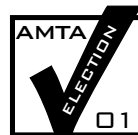

“Take Time For Massage” A Great Success

Last October’s National Massage Therapy Awareness Week (NMTAW) was a terrific success. More members participated than ever before, and AMTA chapters demonstrated many creative ways to attract public attention to massage.

On the national level, AMTA released the results of its 2000 Consumer Survey of attitudes about massage, and worked with television and radio stations in major metropolitan areas to promote the week. This prompted calls from massage therapists who wanted to join AMTA because of AMTA’s promotion of the profession through NMTAW.

On a chapter level, AMTA’s partnership with Home Depot’s Building Better Health program resulted in chapter-coordinated onsite events throughout the country. Chapters in at least five states had their governors issue proclamations for the week. In addition, dozens of members called the National Office to discuss a wide range of NMTAW events they developed on their own.

Each year NMTAW achieves greater awareness of the massage profession, and AMTA looks forward to more success this year.

Moving Forward

The AMTA Board of Directors took the following actions at their meeting in Phoenix, Arizona, last September.

Planning Cycle

The board adopted a planning cycle that will allow it to tie the budgeting process directly to the prioritized Strategic Plan. This planning cycle involves input from the national leadership and staff. In addition, it allows the association to set its budget in relation to the priorities of the Strategic Plan, which are determined by the board through member survey data.

Special Committee

The special committee to further investigate corporate sponsorship/cause event marketing for AMTA was thanked and dismissed as they completed their charge.

Strategic Planning

Based on member survey results, the board set the priorities that will guide the work of the association in fiscal year 2002-2003, in accordance with the newly adopted planning cycle. The priorities are as follows:

Communications

- Develop appropriate messages about massage and massage therapy, and select vehicles of delivery for those messages to each targeted audience, e.g., the public, health-care providers, health-care associations, third-party payers, media, and the wellness community, etc.
- Disseminate information and evidence about the value and effectiveness of massage for health and well-being.

- Proactively represent massage and massage therapy.

Law and Legislation

- Work proactively to create a favorable regulatory climate for massage therapy.
- Support legislative activity that is based on high standards.

Research

- Promote the value and effectiveness of massage as revealed by research.

The priorities will be set each year at the fall board meeting and are a result of the ongoing work of the Strategic Planning Committee.

Hands On

Member survey input has indicated that *Hands On* should be modified from its current format. In response, the board has approved the redesign of the newsletter.

Bylaws

Holding the office of president of the AMTA Council of Schools is one way to qualify for the office of president-elect. Candidates must also have maintained professional membership in the three years prior to their candidacy.

Brochure In Spanish

The board voted to produce the AMTA brochure *Finding a Qualified Massage Therapist* in Spanish. The publication will be available in limited supply, and will assist out-

reach to more diverse communities in communicating the benefits of massage therapy.

Board Approves New Committee

The AMTA Board of Directors approved a new Healthcare Integration Committee to concentrate on the trend toward integrating complementary and alternative medicine with mainstream allopathic health care. The committee's role is to help members understand the issues regarding third-party reimbursement for massage provided by massage therapists, and provide members with information so they can decide how to deal with it in their practices.

Members have indicated in surveys that they are either strongly against or very interested in being involved with the current health-care delivery system and insurance coverage. The committee would like to know your views, questions and concerns about how these issues are affecting your practice, what you are hoping the future will bring, and what AMTA can do for you. 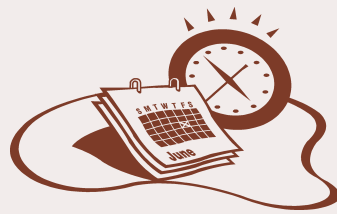
