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## **MERT<sup>TM</sup> Aids In Relief Of Pentagon Rescue Workers**

It was a day that saddened the hearts of Americans, and the world. But while people around the globe watched the aftermath of the tragic terrorist events of September 11, 2001, unfold on television, the AMTA Virginia Chapter Massage Emergency Response Team<sup>TM</sup> (MERT) witnessed the devastation firsthand, and brought comfort to those affected by it.

The Virginia team was contacted by the state's Emergency Medical Services (EMS) to provide massage to rescue workers at the Pentagon, in Arlington, Virginia. AMTA President-Elect **Brenda Griffith (VA)** was one of the first AMTA MERT responders onsite, arriving at 3 a.m. Eastern time on September 12.

Running on adrenaline, Griffith recalls standing by a fence and viewing the crash site for the first time. "It takes your brain awhile to process," she says. "This [building] is our [nation's] defense, and it had a hole in it."

Griffith and seven other AMTA Virginia Chapter MERT responders—**Holly Brim**, Virginia MERT coordinator; **Holly Hermanson**; **Cynthia McIlwee**; **Karen Harrell**; **Beth Thran**; **Mary Molnia**; and **Roger Gossement**—provided massages to firefighters, police officers and other emergency rescue workers in the rehabilitation area, away from the perimeter of the crash site.

Rescue workers were given 10- to 15-minute chair massages. Griffith says most were quiet, but those who talked only spoke of their families. Those who got a massage for the first time were very impressed with the results. "They were grateful," comments Griffith. "They couldn't believe how much better they felt."

Griffith recalls that her arms and hands became tired throughout her shift, but "the opportunity kept me going—the opportunity to let people know what massage can do."

The AMTA Virginia Chapter MERT team just completed its MERT training on August 12. After the disaster, more AMTA Professional\* members were trained in Virginia, September 15 and September 16, to help in the effort.

Because Virginia EMS requires all of its workers to serve no more than 72-hour shifts, they requested the first AMTA Virginia MERT shift off-duty. Griffith, being in full rescue mode, didn't want to leave. "I was almost mad at them," she recalls. "You get caught up. You want to help."

In other AMTA MERT efforts, the AMTA Pennsylvania MERT team was called for a seven-day deployment to the Pennsylvania crash site, beginning the morning of September 19. A call to action came in New York from the New York City Police Department, and AMTA MERT team members arrived in the city the morning of September 20. ## **AMTA Highly Visible At Legislative Conferences**

In an effort to work with legislators to improve regulatory and practice status for massage therapists, AMTA sends representatives to exhibit at national legislative conferences across the country. So far this year, AMTA has attended two national conferences—the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC) and the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL).

The goal of these conferences is to meet state legislators and other legislative staff to show that: 1) massage therapy is a viable profession; and 2) AMTA can be a valuable resource if the legislators are considering massage therapy legislation. Local AMTA members in the areas of the conferences provide on-site massage to the legislators so they can experience, firsthand, the benefits of massage, while gaining insight into the association.

Making connections with legislators at conferences is especially valuable to states that have no massage therapy legislation in place. AMTA members in nonregulated states are provided with the contact information of legislators who have attended these legislative conferences, and are in favor of passing future massage therapy legislation.

Those who attended ALEC (August 1-3 in New York) included **Denise Logsdon (VA)**, Government Relations Committee chair; **Brenda Griffith (VA)**, AMTA vice president; and Cheryl Neely, AMTA government relations staff liaison. Those who attended the August 13-15 NCSL Conference in San Antonio included Logsdon; **Steve Olson (ND)**, former AMTA president; **John Fred Spack (OH)**, Government Relations Committee member; and Neely.

AMTA also will be exhibiting at the National League of Cities in Atlanta on December 6-7.

AMTA's support of legislation stems from the Strategic Plan, approved by the AMTA Board of Directors and based on member survey results showing that legislation is an important priority. The association has had a presence at legislative conferences for almost 10 years.

## **Consumer Survey Shows More People Getting Massage**

Results of the 2001 survey of consumer attitudes about massage, commissioned by AMTA, showed that more Americans went to a massage therapist in the last 12 months (17 percent) than in past years, and more than 24 percent expect to get a massage in the next year.

On July 26, 2001, Opinion Research Corporation International polled 1,000 U.S. adults for their attitudes and usage of massage. This is the fifth year that AMTA has commissioned the study.

Since 1997, the percentage of American adults who say they received a massage from a massage therapist has risen steadily. This year, 27 percent say they have had a massage in the past five years. In 1997, only 17 percent said they had a massage in the previous five years. This means that the number of people who had a massage in just the past year alone (17 percent) is equal to the number of people in 1997 who said they had a massage in a five-year period.

This year, the survey asked questions related to public understanding of massage and massage therapists, as well as the respondents usage of massage. For example, when researchers asked from whom people would prefer to get a massage, 43 percent said they prefer a female massage therapist, but 49 percent said the gender of the massage therapist doesn't matter. Six percent said they prefer a male massage therapist.

More survey respondents (40 percent) prefer to receive a massage from a massage therapist at their own home, while 26 percent prefer the massage therapist's office and 23 percent prefer sessions in a day spa.

The database currently contains approximately 1,800 citations of research articles about massage therapy.

At this time, the database contains all the information necessary to retrieve an article from a library (i.e., author, publication and dates of publication).
